Whereas a previous City Council approved a location for a safe injection site at 101 Wyandotte Street East; and,

Whereas the approved site was put forward quickly after the Windsor Essex County Health Unit failed to secure a lease at another location - 628 Goyeau Street; and,

Dear Windsorites and Ontarians,

RE: WINDSOR COMSUMPTION SITE MUST GO AHEAD - NOW

I am a mother to two children with autism, a former clinical secretary (with all the associated studying of biology, terminology, psychology & administration therein), who worked as liaison with the University of Toronto School of Medicine with Toronto Western Hospital's Family Health team as my first job out of College. I was administrative back up to Dr. Jeff Bloom, a highly regarded Physician and Academic as he prepared for court cases involving horrors committed on small children. I coordinated and sat on rounds for all the things a Program Year 1 & 2 med student learns from. I was raised in downtown Toronto on Queen East, once known for it's own injection drug use problems, now the trendy "beaches".

My birth sister, is an RN in Ottawa, with previous work at the Good Shepherd was unfortunately, too wrapped in her own life to present today. But she has described how alcohol provision now allows more of their shelter residents means to enter more traditional therapy programs over time. And doing so successfully. You will hear much on feelings from locals, but we need to treat a medical issue with ONLY the facts that inform medical "best practice", not feelings of fear for property and safety, and what is ultimately fear of unknown, stemming partially from a sense of moral superiority. Early findings from Canadian evidence from the last half-decade show that providing medications as an alternative to highly toxic illegal drugs for people at risk of overdose can help save lives and improve health outcomes. It can also help establish an entry to primary care and treatment for people with substance use disorder.

Allow me to present the data I found from my lap top in the past 24 hours:

There are of course draw backs to service (namely cost and unforeseen community ostracization), but the cost of inaction on this meaningful and clear data will be ongoing and preventable loss of human life. They are human regardless if they are taxpayers or not. "Nothing without us" includes those illegal and recreational drug users who of course rely on people like me so they not need to marginalize themselves further.

Drug users do not use with intent to die; they most often use to survive.

Thank you for understanding that Windsor must do better when it comes to leading with compassion.

An Open Letter to Windsor City Council from local faith leaders

29 January 2023

We are writing to you to express our support for the Consumption and Treatment site set to open at 101 Wyandotte St. E. We believe that this is a life-saving service and should not be delayed for any reason.

We have come to know the opioid crisis within the lives of our communities of faith and some of us have come to know it personally. Naloxone was distributed to many of our congregations last year by the Health Unit. We read of ever growing numbers of overdoses, deaths and public health warnings and we bear witness to the damage done by drug overdoses at funerals and at prayer.

We are encouraged that WECHU and other organizations have put time and expertise into this site that is just weeks from opening. By providing support through drug checking services, supervised consumption, sterile supplies, basic medical and addictions services this site will save lives.

We remind you that this Consumption and Treatment site has already been approved democratically. This is, by majority, something the community has demonstrated it wants. Years and years of work and consultation with community partners, residents, and businesses cannot be discarded. If there is a motion against the current location, there has to be correlating community data which proves the residents, community partners, and businesses do not want this here - not anecdotal evidence.

As Christians we believe we are at our best when we are loving and supporting the most vulnerable among us. It's clear to us that people who use drugs are vulnerable during this opioid epidemic and that harm reduction *is* love. Faith communities across denominations have been preparing to centre their efforts on helping people in proximity to this Consumption and Treatment site.

We believe that healing and thriving does not happen in isolation. Places that provide shelter, resources, and relationships are central to healing and thriving. This site can be such a place.

For these reasons we pray that you will not withdraw your support from the Consumption and Treatment site. People who use drugs are beloved by God.

Hello,

I would like to contribute the following to the documents submitted in support of the Consumption & Treatment Site and against the motion put forward by Councilor Agostino to rescind support of the CTS as approved previously by Council. I am not a medical practitioner, but I have been serving people who struggle for the last 20 years in my past role as the Executive Director of Victoria Manor Supportive Housing and now in my role with ALSO as the Director of Strategy, Enhanced Services & Partnership Development. I am submitting a brief story as anecdotal support for the CTS and am available for questions this afternoon at Council.

“Several years ago now, when I was working at Victoria Manor, a couple had just injected heroin and immediately realized there was something wrong with their supply. One fell unresponsive, the other, who utilized a wheelchair, tried to make it to the Lead Station for help. They fell unresponsive just before they rounded the corner. Residents called for help and staff responded quickly with the administration of Naloxone.

One staff had the good thought that if this was state of one of them, the partner might be in the same condition in their room. We went running and found the other partner slumped against the wall, unresponsive, half sitting, half laying on their bed.

My staff went to grab Naloxone and inform 911 that we would need a second ambulance as I continued giving chest compressions. They gasped several times then would stop breathing until my pounding on their chest finally got a consistent gurgling response. They were breathing but I it was the most disturbing sound I have ever heard a human make.

Both were taken to hospital - and both survived.

Every time there is a news story about the new Consumption & Treatment Site with the inevitable ensuing comments against the site I think of them. I think of them - who lived because there were people available to help them.

Without a CTS many more will die than live. And perhaps you think that they should, maybe you believe the consequences to their “choices” are theirs. Except death is not suffered by the dead - it’s suffered by those who are left behind. This couple were the children of parents and the parents of children. They were our Residents - friends and neighbours in our home. Their home.



If we do not give substance users a safe space to use, they will die. Harm reduction indisputably saves lives, and recovery is still ALWAYS an option; we must keep our family, our friends, our neighbours alive so that they have the option to choose recovery and in that moment be able to get them the help they are asking for - and though we grieve their addiction, the anguishing grief of the loss of their lives is far too much to ask of us in exchange for the Consumption & Treatment Site.”

Dear Councillors,

I am reaching out to you to discuss the new Safety Injection unit that will be located at the corner of 101 Goyeau Street.

We have been an established hotel for many years and by opening a Safety Injection clinic across the street from our hotel will kill our businesses.

We book several Sports Groups, corporate groups, tour groups and have a high clientele from the US since we are located 1 minute away from the border.

We have issues everyday dealing with the police with the homeless and drug addicts in the area and the police force have been trying to keep this under control but they don't have the manpower to control this.

Speaking with the police force they feel the same way that this is not a good idea to have a Safety Consumption site on a busy corner across from the Tunnel Detroit Border.

"Statistics have been proven we have 12000-13000 vehicles crossing the border, everyday from Wyandotte to Goyeau street. How is this going to be controlled with a Safety Consumption site attracting several drug addicts in need to take their drugs in a safe place. Statistics state the attraction of people walking into these sites are from 500-1000 people a day. "

"When challenged, activists point to Canada, which they have cited as a model of enlightened drug policies. In their policy proposals and campaigns literature, drug legalization advocates argue that safe injection sites in Canada- particularly the Insite facility in Vancouver, British Columbia- have prevented overdose deaths and saved lives.

They should ask a few Canadians in cities throughout the Great White north, a group of insurgent leaders has begun to turn against safe injection sites- and they are winning with voters. Since 2016 anti-safe injection sites candidates have won premierships of Ontario, Alberta, and Manitoba.

Their argument is simple: safe injection sites have not delivered on their promises and have caused a significant increase in trash, crime, and disorder. Public health experts have built safe injection facilities with little public input, creating problems for long-term residents. As Ontario Premier Doug Ford told reporters: "If I put (a safe injection site) beside your house, you'd be going ballistic."

This has been a challenging situation everyday dealing with the drug addicts in the neighborhood and for the safety of our hotel, guests, and employees we are asking the city not to approve this in our location.

We need a team to collaborate to fix this problem, but not on the expense of businesses of downtown area.

We work downtown daily, we had to deal with issues of needles, drugs and unsavoury people coming into our property and harassing our guests and staff and overall making it feel a very unsafe place to work.

We have suffered with several bad reviews talking about the area. This is not a good idea to place a Safety Injection site on Goyeau street with a high traffic area.

Having the injection site across the street from the border crossing will not paint a good picture to tourists it will not make them want to park downtown and dine and shop.

Let's work together to find a better solution for this problem. We want to make sure homeless and addictions will find the help they need but not in the downtown core across the tunnel.
