Re: Essex Region Source Protection Committee - Municipal Representation

As required by the Clean Water Act, 2006, the Essex Region Source Protection Authority (ERSPA) has an established Source Protection Committee (SPC), which follows the guidance of Ontario Regulation 288/07 (O.Reg 288/07). The SPC is composed of 15 members, including five (5) representatives from the municipal sector. The remaining two-thirds of the SPC are representatives of key industries (e.g. agriculture, greenhouse operations, and fuel suppliers) and members of the public at large.

In 2007, the ERSPA striking committee proposed the following composition of municipal representation on the SPC.

- City of Windsor 2 members
- Union Water Supply System 1 member
- Town of Lakeshore 1 member
- Town of Amherstburg 1 member

The striking committee felt that those municipalities responsible for the Water Treatment Plants that provide the largest water supplies should have the opportunity to have representation on the SPC. A letter was sent to all Clerks of Member Municipalities on July 30, 2007 to this effect, and this distribution of representation was subsequently endorsed by all municipalities in 2007 and has remained as such. At this time one municipal member has taken a new position and can no longer sit on the SPC in this role, one municipal member is retiring from the SPC.

In the spring of 2022, the term of appointment for Mayor Nelson Santos, representing Union Water Supply System (UWSS), came to a close when he took on a new position in another municipality. The UWSS Board opted to wait until after the municipal election to select a new representative. At their first meeting on 17 January 2023 they selected Mayor Dennis Rogers as their nominee for representation on the SPC.

Thom Hunt, who has represented the City of Windsor in his role as Executive Director/City Planner for many years is taking this opportunity to step down from the SPC. Frank Garardo, Senior Planner for the City of Windsor has been selected as their new representative on the SPC.

Both Mayor Nelson and Mr. Hunt were valued members of the SPC and will be missed. We look forward to working with the newly selected members.

Municipal Councils are asked to endorse all municipal candidates prior to their formal appointment by the Essex Region Source Protection Authority as a regular SPC member. In keeping with our previous practices, at this time we are asking that all member Municipalities endorse the following individuals' appointment to the Essex Region Source Protection Committee:

- **Dennis Rogers, Union Water Supply System**, appointment date: April 13, 2023; expiration of appointment April 13, 2028.
- **Frank Garardo, City of Windsor**, appointment date: April 13, 2023; expiration of appointment April 13, 2028.

Responses in the form of Council Resolutions are kindly requested by **31 March 2023**. The Essex Region Source Protection Authority is scheduled to address this matter at their meeting on 13 April 2023.

This letter is sent under separate cover to municipal staff who have been appointed by their municipality to assist with Source Water Protection. Please contact me if you require any further information.

I have mentioned previously in Delegations to Windsor City Council the importance the City of Windsor moving towards comphrensive 'Green Standards' and 'Green Policy' similar to the successful evolution and implementation of such in the City of Toronto.


Item 8.8, Dillon Engineer plan recommends varoius engineering solutions yet seemingly little consideration for developing additional Green Infrastructure solutions for stormwater mitigation.

New storm sewer lines, creating more CSO separation, raising certain road levels, additional end of pipe safety features, a new RTB feature all great - but still amiss to incorporate comphrehensive additional Green Infrastructure features to assist in mitigating storm water events.

Item 8.8 also mentions improvements necessary to Sandwich St. particular to where "MeKee Creek" goes under Sandwich St. Improvements necessitated in part due to the new Bicycle Path paid for by the WDBA / BNA Community Benefits Plan Sandwich St. Revitalization Plan. There is great opportunity to enhance and signify the historic presense of McKee Creek at the ETR crossing by creating a significant iconic architectural safety feature. Please consider this opportunity for a public Art safety feature at this location that can serve as a West end 'bookend' to the existing Historic Arch near the round about at the Eat end of Sandwich St.

Request to be written Delegation to Item No. 8.3 - "A Provisional By-Law for the Repair and Improvement to the McKee Drain" Feb. 28, 2022 Windsor City Council

Hello

RE: I would like to request to submit my written Delegation regarding - Item No. 8.3 - "A Provisional By-Law for the repair and Improvement to the McKee Drain" (C26/2022) for the City of Windsor Council Meeting of February 28, 2022.

Could you please include my attachments (photo illustration) and copy of this e-mail.

Item No. 8.3 is largely relegated to the overdue functional improvements of McKee Creek. Particularly since the alterations by the Herb Gray Parkway, the lack of proper maintenance of sections over the years and subsequent necessities of mitigating projected future Climate Change events. However, there is also an opportunity presented here and now - to create something of greater lasting urban / culture value. A new design to benefit the citizens of Windsor, particularly Sandwich Town. For example, beyond just extending an existing culvert under Sandwich St. near the ETR Railway crossing - to actually creating a new dual Urban Design feature that can celebrate our heritage and express our modern future. A functional, architectural Gateway iconic feature - that can serve to denote the new Pedestrian and Cycling Trail connections from Sandwich Town to the new Gordie Howe International Bridge. A functional Public Art piece that protects Pedestrian / Cyclist passerby, signifies the natural heritage location of McKee Creek and can serve as a transitional cultural signifier of the Modern architecture of the New Gordie Howe International Bridge (GHIB) to the beginnings of the rich cultural heritage of Old Sandwich Town. As much as the Tecumseh / Brock Statue in the East end roundabout of Sandwich St. and the nearby East end Sandwich Gateway Arch denotes the East entrance to Sandwich Town, a new modern feature not to far from the Pedestrian / Cyclist entrance to the new Gordie Howe International Bridge could pay homage to the modern architecture of the new GHIB near the West endpoint. As a sub note: General Brock and Chief Tecumseh's accomplishments are also commemorated at the existing stone pylon Federal Plaque Marker at the West end jog in Sandwich St. not too far from the new GHIB. This existing West end stone pylon commemorates the area where Brock Soldiers and Tecumseh's warriors crossed the Detroit River during the beginning of the War of 1812 to invade Fort Detroit at Springwells on the American side. This exis

Presently there is no direct vehicular access from the GHIB to Sandwich Town, other than an off ramp from the Ojibway overpass / Herb Gray Parkway. While that may be a good thing for lessening further unnecessary future Truck Traffic on Sandwich St., it does present challenges for motorist Tourists visiting Windsor and Sandwich from the USA. New Wayfair signage in appropriate locations can assist there. Fortunately the proposed new Trail and Sidewalk linkages (along Sandwich St.) as part of the 'Sandwich St. Revitalization Project Community Benefits' of the WDBA / BNA will provide new opportunity for something unique - a direct Pedestrian / Cyclist connection (and free passage with Passport) to and from Sandwich, Canada to Detroit, Michigan, USA. This is an extraordinary opportunity Windsor has never had since the days of my Grandmother - when local citizens were once allowed to walk across the Ambassador Bridge. What better way to entice new tourism and cultural / economic exchange than to make the trip more scenic and journey eventful with a sequence of new welcoming attributes along the way. A 'New architectural feature at the McKee Creek' and Sandwich St. will not only be the subject of Tourist attributes brochure enticement (not unlike Windsor's Public Art at the Riverfront) but may also be seen from the H G Parkway crossings, various approaches and possibly even the Gordie Howe Bridge itself. The proposed new WDBA / BNA trail being not just a new connecting path to the rich heritage of Sandwich Town and historic Detroit neighbourhoods (Springwells Indigenous history, Delray, Fort Wayne etc.) but, done right - to help create an enjoyable and eventful journey and stopping point between destinations. To celebrate nature, our local history and landscapes. I have attached some yet undeveloped, basic illustrative examples.

Although presently the WDBA / BNA ,5 year Annual Community Fund (up to \$25,000 per restricted individual local NFP entity) may not cover a project like this - there are certainly other greater elements of the WDBA / BNA Community Benefits that could assist. Although this particular idea for this location is mine, there are plenty of other Civic examples by others elsewhere that back up the Civic merit of this idea and its creation of worthy attainable goals. I applaud this City report on the McKee Creek improvements and can only hope this will include even further re-naturalization then is presently presented. Both on public and private sector lands that the McKee Creek is channeled and meanders. To the East the Canal also of heritage interest, North of Sandwich St. the site of several former era Resort Hotels and the rich international heritage of the former Sandwich Minerals Springs.

On an additional sub-note (which I have mentioned before to Windsor City Council in the recent past) there is also great potential to design something more architecturally significant than a proposed new (mostly underground) City of Windsor RTB facility planned for the West junction of Ojibway Parkway and Sandwich St. This odd dog-leg and peninsular split of the main artery, Ojibway Parkway to that of Sandwich St. is the result of the somewhat hidden history of Ojibway. When Ojibway was first planned as a new industrial Steel Town in the early 20th Century. The foreign Steel interest of the time diverted shore hugging Sandwich St. (Bedford St.) to create the new Ojibway Road further South. Diverted as to not publicly impinge on the new Industry's ill-fated future commercial steel works industrial precinct. An industrial project that for the most part never came to full fruition and was eventually abandoned and demolished.

When the much needed, new City of Windsor RTB Project finally moves forward, there is also further opportunity to create something of greater architectural design value there to last the ages. To signify that the City of Windsor cares about quality design. Windsor in the past, has on occasion created some decent utilitarian water works / stormwater pumping structures. When the Ojibway West end RTB moves forward, that would be the time to go beyond that design heritage and create something even more dramatic architecturally, and culturally meaningful. Something to enhance the natural environment and the new connector Trails between Windsor and Detroit presented by the building of the new, modern Gordie Howe International Bridge.
