5. <u>COMMUNICATIONS</u>

5.1 E-Mail from Chris Woodall

Chris Woodall, resident, 2585 Lincoln Road is present to speak to the matter regarding noise issues due to the VACIS (Vehicle and Cargo Inspection System) System installed to scan the rail cars prior to their entrance to the United States. He notes when the trains start to "shunt" there is a large banging sound and adds there is no noise mitigation barriers between their residence and the tracks. He indicates the Federal Assessment – Windsor VACIS Secure Corridor stated the VACIS System would cause no environmental impacts to the residents.

In response to a question asked by Councillor Jones regarding if the noise occurs at certain times of the day, Mr. Woodall responds it occurs all day.

Councillor Valentinis questions who oversees the VACIS System. M. Palanacki responds CP Rail and the U.S. Border Security.

- M. Winterton advises landscaping features provide no noise attenuation. He states lighting and fencing are required for a secure corridor. In terms of the noise issue, an appeal could be made to CP and the CTA.
- J. Eugeni indicates public information centres relating to the Howard Grade Separation Environmental Assessment were held and comments received were documented in the Study Report. This study was separate from the Federal Assessment Mr. Woodall is citing.

6. REPORTS

6.2 Proposed Terms of Reference for Central Box Environmental Assessment

Patrick Redko is present to speak to the Central Box Environmental Assessment. He states he is pleased the Environmental Assessment is moving forward, however, he expresses concern relating to the safety of cyclists, and pedestrians. He states the sidewalks "stop and go nowhere".

J. Eugeni indicates the general problems and opportunities in the Central Box Study Area have been provided in the report 16847 *Central Box Environmental Assessment RFP*.

In response to a question asked by Councillor Halberstadt regarding if CN should be contacted prior to the initiation of the RFP, M. Palanacki advises once City Council determines the Terms of Reference, CN will be contacted.

Councillor Maghnieh asks the following questions:

- What is the actual resolution of Council?
- What needs to go back to Council?
- What are the timelines to send out the RFP?
- From a safety standpoint, how does this fit in the Official Plan in this area?
- In terms of funding, why have no monies been available?

The Council Resolution CR155/213 is provided in Appendix A of the report. Minutes of the Rail Issues Committee are approved by Council and since the resolution required the noted review by the Rail Issues Committee, the RFP will be published after Council has considered the results of this review.

M. Sonego states the RFP will be published early in the new year, pending Council decision. The timeframe allows sufficient time for the consultants to respond to the RFP and for administration to review the submissions and to prepare the necessary contract documents with the successful bidder. It is anticipated the project will commence in Spring of 2014 and will likely take in excess of one year to complete

The Capital Funding is generally awarded to projects after the preferred alternative has been identified and the study has been completed. The timing of funding is at Council discretion.

Councillor Valentinis suggests recommendations from the Rail Issues Committee proceed directly to Council with this report as Council has already had direct involvement.

City will push for safety at crossing

The City of Windsor will ask CN Rail to beef up safety measures at one of its crossings after a train collided with an SUV.

"Based on development in

the area, we are going to be pressing CN that perhaps they need to increase the level of protection, even though they meet the standards now," said Mike

Palanacki, the city's executive director of operations.

A woman driving the SUV suffered non-life-threatening injuries in the crash, which happened around 7:45 p.m. Tuesday.

Windsor police said the SUV was headed south on Concession 7, near the Windsor Christian Fellowship, when it crossed into the path of a westbound freight train.

The SUV was heavily damaged. Firefighters had to free the woman from the wreckage.

The crossing is only marked by a static "X" sign. Palanacki said the crossing meets minimum safety standards, but the city is hoping CN will go beyond that. One concern about the crossing, he said, is that the road and rail line don't meet at a 90-degree angle.

"There's quite a skew where the road and the railway line meet," he said. "It's somewhat difficult to see the approaching trains."

Palanacki said he'd like to see wigwags and flashing lights at the crossing.

"We will be following up with CN to see if they're prepared to improve the level of safety," he said.

"There are minimum guidelines. They can always exceed the minimum. Having the flashing lights would be a higher level of protection."

CN spokesman Patrick Waldron stressed the crossing does meet necessary standards, but added the company is willing to listen to the city's concerns.

"We would welcome discussions with the city as part of this shared process for the warning systems;" he said.
