





What is a wetland?


"Lands that are seasonally or permanently covered by shallow water as well as lands where the water table is close to or at the water table is close to or at the surface. In either case, the presence of abundant water has caused the formation of <u>hydric</u> soils and has favoured the dominance of either <u>hydrophytic</u> plants or <u>water tolerant</u> plants".


The four major types of wetlands are swamps, marshes, bogs and fens.





















































What are some priority actions?

05

- We don't know where all of the provincially significant wetlands in the region are – they have not been identified
- There is a need to encourage municipal evaluation and protection of wetlands
- There is a need to establish clear, region-wide targets for the protection and restoration of of wetlands
- Review and apply relevant priority actions from the Wetland Conservation Strategy for Ontario 2017-2030 in the Windsor-Essex region
- Encourage and support research to understand links between protection of wetlands and reducing urban flooding.
