To APPROVE our application for financial support from WAAC in the amount of \$75,000 for equipment to enhance the experience of disabled patrons utilizing our Family Aquatic Complex (FAC) AND, to SUPPORT the application for a grant of \$50,000 from Human Resources and Skills Development Canada for a Small Projects enabling accessibility grant.

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY:

2. **BACKGROUND:**

The existing Building Design of the Family Aquatic Complex (FAC) exceeds City of Windsor Barrier Free Design Standards.

At the July meeting of the Windsor Accessibility Advisory Committee Madonna and Connie Strange requested we look at various accessibility approaches to the design of the FAC.

3. DISCUSSION:

Administration has reviewed the suggestions of Connie and Madonna Strange which were received by the Advisory Committee and forwarded to the Steering Committee of the FAC for review.

The Steering Committee of the FAC directed the Project Manager FAC to review the request and report back.

Our request to financially support purchase of accessible equipment will allow universal access to all persons with disabilities in our community to enjoy the Family Aquatic Complex. Examples of the equipment requested include but are not limited to the following:

- 2 Ceiling tiles
- 2 Power adult change tables
- 6 Aqua bikes
- 4 Aqua treadmills
- 8 Aqua wheelchairs
- 8 Floatation aids
- 12 Specialized life jackets

This grant application to Human Resources and Skills Development Canada for a Small Projects enabling accessibility grant, will focus on floor markings in the tile floor to allow those patrons declared legally blind, however can distinguish colour markings or shading in the floor tile, directional access through our lobby to the change rooms and on to our pool deck areas.

4. RISK ANALYSIS:

The addition of this equipment will ensure safe use of our facility by all patrons in the community.

5. FINANCIAL MATTERS:

Approval of the funding of \$75,000 for the equipment from the Windsor Accessibility Advisory Committee will greatly improve the presentation of accessibility features.

The support for our application to HRSD for a Small Projects enabling accessibility grant in the amount of \$50,000 will improve the floor markings to allow improved access for the blind.





2. **BACKGROUND:**

Human Resources and Skills Development Canada announced on August 21, 2012 calls for proposals for a Small Project enabling accessibility grant with a closing date of October 5, 2012.

The Steering Committee at their meeting of July 19th 2012 requested the FAC team to review the suggested accessibility approaches presented by Madonna and Connie Strange to the Windsor Accessibility Advisory Committee July meeting.

"Moved by councillor Sleiman, seconded by Councillor Jones,

That the Project Manager BE REQUESTED to investigate the cost of a lift and structural reinforcement for the lift for the family accessible change rooms and to report back".

3. DISCUSSION:

Upon review of eligible projects, the FAC team suggests the application be for upgrades to the tile flooring of the FAC to allow the legally blind, who can distinguish shades of colour, directional markings which lead them through the lobby, to change rooms and out to the pools.

An application will be made to the City of Windsor Accessbility Advisory Committee by the FAC Project Manager and the Executive Director of Recreation and Culture for funding support to purchase the following equipment to allow for greater participation for disabled patrons:

- 2 Ceiling lifts
- 2 Powered adult change tables
- 6 Aqua bikes
- 4 Aqua treadmills
- 8 Aqua wheelchairs
- 8 Floatation aids
- 12 Specialized life jackets

4. RISK ANALYSIS:

Safe access and egress by all of patrons using the FAC is a very desirable goal and requirement.

5. FINANCIAL MATTERS:

The grant for a Small Project enabling accessibility is for \$50,000 which, after discussion with the FAC design team and the tile contractor, will be enough funding to design and place the specialized markings in the tile floor of the FAC.

The estimated costs of the equipment requested to be purchased by the City of Windsor Accessibility Advisory Committee is \$60,000.

Agenda 5.1 Facility Accessibility Design Standards

14.3 Standards: Accessible Swimming Pools

Swimming is an important recreational and therapeutic activity for many persons with disabilities. Primary considerations for accommodating persons who have mobility impairments include accessible change facilities and a means of access into the water. Ramped access into the water is preferred over lift access, as it promotes integration (everyone will use the ramp) and independence.

- 14.3.1 In addition to the design requirements specified in Section 5.0 through to Section 13.0, swimming pools, wading pools, hot pools and therapy pools shall comply with this section.
- 14.3.2 Swimming pools, wading pools, hot pools and therapy pools shall have:
- 14.3.2.1 where the pool is indoors, a direct accessible route in compliance with Section 9.0 from the lobby/entrance to the change rooms;
- 14.3.2.2 a direct accessible route in compliance with Section 9.0 from the change rooms to the pool deck;
- 14.3.2.3 access from the pool deck into the water, provided by a ramp sloped no steeper than 1:12. In retrofit situations where it is technically infeasible to provide a ramp, a mechanical pool lift can be used;
- 14.3.2.4 a shower chair available at each facility for use in transferring into the water;
- 14.3.2.5 where steps are provided into the pool, steps marked with a colour-contrasting strip at least 0.05m (2 in.) wide, at both the riser and the tread;
- 14.3.2.6 where steps are provided into the pool, colour-contrasting handrails on both sides of the steps. Such handrails shall extend at least 0.3m (12 in.) beyond the pool edge;

- 14.3.2.7 where an up-stand edge is provided, it shall be a minimum of 0.2m (8 in.) and a maximum of 0.4m (16 in.) in height;
- 14.3.2.8 pool boundaries clearly defined by both a textural change and a colour contrast to both the water surface and surrounding pavement;
- 14.3.2.9 firm, slip-resistant materials and finishes used on the pool perimeter, deck or paved areas surrounding the pool;
- 14.3.2.10 non-abrasive and easy-to-clean pool perimeter finishes;
- 14.3.2.11 adequate drainage on the pool deck to drain water quickly;
- 14.3.2.12 where pool-depth indicator marking is provided, depth indicator markings, as well as "SHALLOW END" and "DEEP END" markings, of a highly contrasting colour and sufficient size to be easily visible;
- 14.3.2.13 where diving boards or platforms are provided, they shall be clearly marked and protected. Overhead clearances should be a minimum of 2.03m (6"-8") or protected by suitable guards;
- 14.3.2.14 where lanes, and/or lane markers are provided, they shall be of a highly contrasting colour. Tie-off devices for lane markers shall be positioned such that they do not create a tripping hazard;
- 14.3.2.15 where starting blocks are provided, they shall be of a highly contrasting colour and capable of being securely fixed in place;
- 14.3.2.16 safety equipment and other accessories shall be stored such that they do not present a tripping hazard; and
- 14.3.2.17 lifeguard chairs, slides and other pool related structures shall be in highly contrasting colours.
- 14.3.3 Wading pool access shall be safe and gradual, so that a child with a disability can be assisted into the water easily and/or use a wheelchair to enter.
- 14.3.4 Swimming pools shall be of "level deck" design.

Integrated Accessibility Standard--Accessible taxi cabs

Duties of municipalities, accessible taxicabs

- 79. (1) Every municipality shall consult with its municipal accessibility advisory committee, where one has been established in accordance with subsection 29 (1) or (2) of the Act, the public and persons with disabilities to determine the proportion of on-demand accessible taxicabs required in the community. O. Reg. 191/11, s. 79 (1).
- (2) Every municipality shall identify progress made toward meeting the need for on-demand accessible taxicabs, including any steps that will be taken to meet the need, in its accessibility plan required under Part I. O. Reg. 191/11, s. 79 (2).
- (3) Municipalities shall meet the requirements of this section by January 1, 2013. O. Reg. 191/11, s. 79 (3).
 - (4) In this section,
 - "accessible taxicab" means an accessible taxicab as defined in section 1 of Regulation 629 of the Revised Regulations of Ontario, 1990 (Vehicles for the Transportation of Physically Disabled Persons) made under the *Highway Traffic Act.* O. Reg. 191/11, s. 79 (4).

Duties of municipalities, taxicabs

- 80. (1) Any municipality that licenses taxicabs shall ensure that owners and operators of taxicabs are prohibited,
 - (a) from charging a higher fare or an additional fee for persons with disabilities than for persons without disabilities for the same trip; and
 - (b) from charging a fee for the storage of mobility aids or mobility assistive devices. O. Reg. 191/11, s. 80 (1).
- (2) Any municipality that licenses taxicabs shall ensure that owners and operators of taxicabs place vehicle registration and identification information on the rear bumper of the taxicab. O. Reg. 191/11, s. 80 (2).
- (3) Any municipality that licenses taxicabs shall ensure that owners and operators of taxicabs make available vehicle registration and identification information in an accessible format to persons with disabilities who are passengers. O. Reg. 191/11, s. 80 (3).

(4) The information in subsection (2) shall meet the requirements of subsection 58 (3). O. Reg. 191/11, s. 80 (4).

Good afternoon,


This morning I received the attached drawing for review and so WAAC could provide comments (the drawing shows wheelchair ramp and pedestrian crossing alignments and can be used as a guide when dealing with developers installing new sidewalks and wheelchair ramps on City streets). I have included the relevant sections from the Facility Accessibility Design standards for your consideration when reviewing the drawing. We will discuss this at the meeting also. If there is any further info you require please let me know and I can ask the required questions prior to our meeting.

6.5 Standards: Sidewalk and Walkway Curb Ramps

- 6.5.1 Wherever sidewalks and walkways of different elevations intersect with other sidewalks or walkways, parking lots, driveways or streets, a transition between the surface of the sidewalk or walkway and such other features should be provided.
- 6.5.2 Sidewalk and walkway curb ramps should be constructed to the following specifications:
 - 6.5.2.1 Sidewalk and walkway curb ramps should have a minimum width of 1.22m (48 in.) across the usable surface of the curb ramp, exclusive of flared sides.
 - 6.5.2.2 Curb ramps shall have flared sides where pedestrians are likely to walk across them. Refer to Figure 6.5-A.


- 6.5.2.3 Sidewalk and walkway curb ramps should have a minimum gradient of 1:12.
- 6.5.2.4 Sidewalk and walkway curb ramps should have flared side slopes with a minimum gradient of 1:10.
- 6.5.2.5 Sidewalk and walkway curb ramps should not contain a grate, manhole or other opening.
- 6.5.3 The maximum running slope of a curb ramp shall be 1:10.1 to 1:12 for a maximum vertical rise between landings of 0.15m (6 in.) and a running slope of 1:8 to 1:10 for a maximum vertical rise between landings of 0.075m (3 in.).

- 6.5.4 The maximum horizontal length of a curb ramp shall not exceed 2.0m (79 in.)
- 6.5.5 Surfaces of curb ramps shall be permanent, firm and slip resistant, of colours and texture contrasting with adjacent surfaces, and have a smooth transition from the ramp and adjacent surfaces. Refer to Figure 6.5-A and Figure 6.5-B.

6.6 Standards: Sidewalk and Walkway Detectable Warning Surfaces and Guiding Strips

- 6.6.1 Sidewalks and walkways should have linear detectable strips that define the edges of the walkway as a warning and orientation system for people who are visually impaired.
- 6.6.2 Tactile cues on walking surfaces should be provided as warning of possible obstacles and hazards within and adjacent to paths of travel, conflicts between pedestrian and vehicular paths of travel, and approaches to the top and bottom landings of ramps and stairs.
- 6.6.3 The use and application of texture pattern for each type of tactile cue should be consistent and should not be used for purposes other than tactile cues.
- 6.6.4 The area of a tactile cue shall extend from hazards, paths of vehicular travel, ramps or stairs, a distance of not less than 1.0 m (39 in.) for the full width of the hazard, path of vehicular travel, ramp or stair, as the case may be.
- 6.6.5 Warning surfaces and guide strips should be installed according to the following specifications:
 - 6.6.5.1 Warning surfaces and guide stripes should be slip-resistant and easily detectable by walking upon as being different from the surrounding walking surface.
 - 6.6.5.2 Warning surfaces and guide strips should be laid in a simple and logical manner.
 - 6.6.5.3 Warning surfaces and guide strips should have a colour that contrasts with the surrounding surface.
 - 6.6.5.4 The warning surface and guide strips ridge profile should be parallel to the main direction of movement and should be flush with the top layer of the adjacent road surface so as not to hinder people with mobility problems.

6.6.5.5 Where travel routes change direction, there should be a gradual change in the direction of the warning surface or guiding strips

Learn about new speech-in/speech-out web based technology developed at the University of Windsor. Learn how municipalities are adapting their recreation programs to make them inclusive, which provides the opportunity for active living lifestyle development for all residents. Take the opportunity to visit the many booths at the Information Fair, all providing valuable information on resources and tools available to improve accessibility. Network and share best practices of accessibility initiatives within your community.

KEYNOTE SPEAKER: JOHN DRAPER, FOUNDER OF "TOGETHER WE ROCK!"

The mission of *Together We Rock!* is to promote learning and leadership opportunities to inspire people to build communities that are accessible to and inclusive of people with disabilities. John believes that teamwork is at the heart of accomplishing this vision. John Draper is the founder of Together We Rock! and is a graduate of the journalism program of Durham College in Oshawa. John is a contributor to several books and is the author of numerous published articles. He has been an advisor to and a participant in international, national and community research initiatives and committees related to accessibility, inclusive education and augmentative communication. John has received numerous international and community awards in recognition of his efforts to promote inclusion and accessibility, including the Possum – ISAAC Award presented by the Right Honourable John Bercow, Speaker of the House of Commons of the United Kingdom. At its convocation ceremony in 2007, his alma mater recognized John as an Alumnus of Distinction.

Attend any 3 of the following 6 breakout sessions:

SpeechWeb - A network of hyperlinked speech applications deployed over the Internet

Despite remarkable advances in speech recognition technology over the last few years, very few speech-in/speech-out applications are available over the web. **Dr. Richard Frost, Acting Director, School of Computer Science, University of Windsor** and his research students at the University of Windsor have developed a "SpeechWeb" architecture and software that allows non-experts to create speech applications and deploy them on the web in minutes. SpeechWeb uses an open source speech recognizer and voice synthesizer, and commonly-used communications protocols. Users access the speech applications through an open-source web browser which can be installed on a PC in minutes. Users can interact with remote applications by voice with no training. Example speech applications include simple question-answer applications, speech browsing of Wikipedia, natural-language database querying and speech games.

Substance Abuse Addictions Among People with Co-existing Disabilities

The *Ontario Human Rights Code* clearly states alcoholism and drug addiction are disabilities, and provides a guarantee of equal treatment with respect to services without discrimination on specified grounds, including disability. Statistics show that persons with other co-existing disabilities are at an even greater risk for substance abuse problems. This includes problems related to the abuse of alcohol and prescription medications, as well as illicit drugs.

Research indicates that rates of substance abuse problems vary widely across disability. *Pascale Bedard, Senior Methadone Co-ordinator, Erie St. Clair Clinic*, will speak about how critical it is to promote public awareness and education about issues related to alcoholism, drug addiction, and substance abuse faced by persons with other co-existing disabilities. Substance abuse service providers must deliver an appropriate level of access and accommodation to cross-disabled persons (people with substance abuse issues and other disabilities). However, few substance abuse treatment programs in Canada currently provide supportive accommodations to persons with disabilities.

No Limits

Chris Daw, Gold Medalist and four-time Paralympian, is the only athlete in Canadian history to represent Canada at multiple Paralympic games for four different sports and is only one of a handful of athletes in Canada to represent Canada at both summer and winter games. Chris will share his own story of courage and determination in life. He takes a hard look at dealing with unexpected changes, discoveries and challenges in life. Chris has had his share of challenges that saw him journey through four Paralympics to finally capturing Gold triumph at Torino Paralympic Games in 2006. Living in a time where the understanding and inclusion of people with disabilities was still being figured out, he has developed a strategy for facing and dealing with life's unexpected turns. He shares his story of discovery of life.

Building a Lasting legacy: Seize your opportunity for greatness one step at a time

The true essence of life is captured by the notion that the prosperity of wisdom and the promise of opportunity should be afforded to all. *Kevin McShan, Reporter, CFTV34,* will speak on how inclusion for the entire human race will lay the foundation for a fully functioning and vibrant society for future generations. "The day in which we close our minds from learning life lessons from all people is the day we must cease and desist from our only existence because that's the day we lose our soul and will to live. We all have a gift to share; it is after all, a diversified world of people which will ultimately help us reach our fullest potential".

Inclusive Recreation Programs Promoting Active Living

Participation of people with disabilities together in recreation programs of their choice, enhances the quality of life for everyone. This can be achieved by encouraging the development of active healthy lifestyles through safe, accessible, diverse and high quality recreational opportunities. Municipalities and community-based recreation program providers throughout the Province are beginning to recognize the need to provide inclusion for people with disabilities into community activities of their choice. *Laurie Quinlan and Christine Wootton* will share how the City of London has adapted municipal recreation programs and integrated services for people with disabilities (via video conference). *Ashley Gialelem*, a youth ambassador from the Active Living Alliance for Canadians with a Disability, will also share her experiences with community/municipal recreation programs and suggestions for inclusion and active living lifestyles of persons with disabilities.

Depression - An Invisible Disability

Depression is an invisible disability that affects your thoughts, moods, feelings, behavior and physical health. People used to think it was "all in your head" and that if you really tried, you could "pull yourself out of it." Doctors now know that depression is not a weakness and you can't treat it on your own. It's a medical disorder with a biological or chemical basis. Sometimes, a stressful life event triggers depression. Other times depression seems to occur spontaneously with no identifiable specific cause. Whatever the cause, depression is much more than grieving or a bout of the blues. While depression is a disability on its own, statistics have shown that it is very common for people who have other coexisting disabilities to experience depression. Marc Crundwell, Psychologist, Greater Essex County District School Board, will inform attendees at this session on how they can learn some of the signs of clinical depression. Find out some tips on how, as a caregiver, you can be the first line of defense or as a person who may be experiencing feelings of depression, how you can be your own advocate and seek the guidance of a primary care physician or certified counsellor.


