Dear Mayor Dilkens & Members of Council:

I am writing on behalf of the Downtown Windsor Business Improvement Association in support of Windsor Pride and Youssef Hair Boutique's request to extend their respective leases, at the Pelissier Street Parking Garage, by 6 months.

While the DWBIA does not support Council's decision to revert the commercial retail spaces back to parking, we believe the request for a lease extension to be a completely separate and important issue. Both businesses/organizations have had difficulty finding suitable premises within the DWBIA, partly as a result of decreased commercial vacancies in the city centre, and we are deeply concerned that - with the eviction deadline of May 31 fast looming - Youssef Hair Boutique may close shop and, not only, not relocated downtown but not relocate elsewhere in the City.

With respect to Windsor Pride, if they are not afforded the extension, they would not be able to provide invaluable services to their many clients for a period of several weeks/months. This, in term, presents a hardship to their clients, staff, and the general public.

The DWBIA urges Council to look favourably on Windsor Pride and Youssef Hair Boutique's request for a 6 month extension, and believe that it would go a long way in affording these organizations/businesses sufficient time to find suitable premises elsewhere in the city centre.

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY:

BACKGROUND:

The Alcohol and Gaming Commission of Ontario (AGCO) requires a municipality to designate a special event as 'Significant Event Status' for the purpose of those applying for liquor licensing permits and approval, regarding their operation of liquor services during their event. The AGCO regulations also state that this designation must be secured annually.

DISCUSSION:

Council approves requests for Significant Status for the purpose of event organizers applying for liquor licensing permits and approval, regarding their operation of liquor

services during their event. Examples in the past of Council approvals have included the following events in 2016: Windsor Fork and Cork Festival, Windsor Rib Festival, The Pier Food Fest, Great Canadian Quaff, Pop up Dinner, Windsor Sausage Festival and the Windsor Craft Beer Festival, (CR219/2016) and the following events to date in 2017: Windsor Fork and Cork Festival, Windsor Rib Festival, Dinner on the Pier, Dinner on the Beach, Coming Home Festival, Windsor Craft Beer Festival, the Great Canadian Quaff, and the Sausage Party (approved at the April 10, 2017 Council meeting). Administration and SERT Committee members have no objection to this event applying for Significant Status designation for their 2017 event. Administration has also met with the local AGCO representatives, who did not object to these events applying for Significant Event Status.

The Municipal Information Systems Association of Canada (MISA) is holding their Ontario Conference at Caesars Windsor from June 4 – 7, 2017. The event at the Riverfront Festival Plaza on June 6, 2017 is an opportunity for conference delegates to enjoy one of Windsor's premiere facilities on the waterfront for dinner and entertainment.

The event organizer will be expected to enter into an agreement with the Corporation to the extent similar to the other festivals and events that currently are presented at Riverfront Festival Plaza, including indemnifying the City of Windsor of any future legal, environmental, or financial liability associated with the event.

RISK ANALYSIS:

Consumption of alcohol within the festival site will occur at the event. The applicant will be required to adhere to the Municipal Alcohol Policy.

Significant Event Status allows the organizer to directly control the service of alcoholic beverages, with the revenues and expenditures related to the service attributable to the organizer. Should Significant Event Status not be approved for these large scale events, the organizers have indicated that it will likely negatively impact their events financially.

FINANCIAL MATTERS:

The applicant will be required to pay the applicable fees as per the 2017 Schedule of Fees.

The City of Windsor recognizes the importance of special events and festivals in enhancing the quality of life, tourism, culture, recreation and education, all of which would not be possible without the invaluable services of volunteers, community groups, and sponsors that add their support and skills to enhancing the community events.

It is time to confront the reality of a municipal system in Windsor that has not served its residents in an accountable and transparent way. The mayor's office, not city council, has decided the agenda. Allegations of conflict of interest and favoritism are becoming more common.

Two cases seem to underline this theme – the Sandwich case and KeepKarenSafe.

I would like to offer several observations regarding the process, or lack of, in dealing with matters of heritage and safety, in particular. I speak as a former Canadian vice-president of the Algonquin Club of Windsor and Detroit, and as an executive member of the Essex County Historical Society. While I am not representing them, I do express their concern in a matter which is of considerable interest on both sides of the border, the placing of the monument in Sandwich.

It was John Muir's wish to have this monument facing the Detroit River, with a view to Detroit – a suitable arrangement for maximum visibility. This would, clearly, be a tourist attraction in Paterson Park, and allow for commercial development outlining War of 1812 stories of interest, with illustrations. In fact, this could provide a catalyst for development of the Sandwich area.

However, as a participant in the April 4 meeting in Sandwich with councilor John Elliott, it became obvious that the fate of the monument was sealed, with no input from the Sandwich BIA or those who assisted in raising funds for, what Mr. Muir stressed, was to be an educational site, thinking of the Brock students he cared for. Although no sketches of the proposed council decision were provided, this roundabout site had been decided, we were informed. In other words, prior to city council approval, the mayor and some of his administration had given orders, that Elliott was following. Case closed.

What is particularly upsetting is the treatment of Mary Ann Cuderman, recipient of the prestigious Lajeunesse Award for contribution to local history in Windsor. Recognized in both the United States and Canada for her decades of heritage work in the west side, in her own city she is brushed off repeatedly. Her supporters, once again, are overlooked. Their historical research is dismissed.

Although those at the Sandwich meeting had spent most of their adult life advocating for a stronger economic and political role for the west side, as well as fighting for recognition of Sandwich's rich past, their points were not accepted, nor listened to... . No representative from the city either in art or history was invited.

Speaking with my councilor April 7, I was told that there had been no discussion of this topic with city council members, so there was no decision. Once again, however, in an e-mail to those attending the April 4 meeting in Sandwich, councilor Elliott stated that council had made the decision. Something doesn't add up.

When asked about the lack of input on the placement of the monument, and/or the complete disregard of the Heritage committee, the Ward 2 councilor simply repeated that this was a done deal. This lack of a proper process for safety, as well as the other issues raised by putting a monument of great historical significance in a roundabout – inaccessible to students, tourists and the general public –

makes no sense.

But, this is hardly the first time some councilors and the mayor have ignored research and informed criticism which didn't please them, or the 'admin.'

Conflict of interest is, also, an issue in some other recent decisions that ignore common sense, and may lead to serious injury or death. Creating potentially the most dangerous crossing for students and resident in South Windsor at a crosswalk, making a speed zone by design out of a 'Traffic Calmed' street where students cross by widening the corner for easier access, i.e. a short-cut, and destroying the integrity of a quiet, residential street where young families are used to a safe street. Citizens on Karen listen to city PR about an attractive lifestyle promoted in the city.

This is the promise, however, only for selected areas of the city, it seems. Depends who your friends are. It is good to know a city councilor, or two, and/or some high officials in administration, even the police department. Allegations of conflict of interest implicating city council and the police were not dealt with. There were no comments allowed at a Roseland P.S. open house, where the city had displayed the closure of Karen St.

Shortly after, the city changed its mind, officially. The corner where studies had shown emergency vehicles would be best suited as a route up three streets was now to be closed. Seemed someone very important must live there. No follow-up meeting was held, to allow for questions, and two committee meetings were cancelled, prior to a city council vote which suggested limited, if any, study of the intersection, or any understanding of the issues raised by KeepKarenSafe supporters. Petitions presented were ignored. The overwhelming majority of residents couldn't understand the city.

Only those in the know could state, "Good luck trying to change things". Most would think that the protocol on street closures would be followed. Not this time, as submissions related to Karen Street being closed were now used to explain what the city had done, although all of this was taken out of context. Good luck... .

Perhaps the current method of making decisions in Windsor could be used as a case study of municipal government. The leadership style is somewhat unique.
